10 years with Food for the Poor

It was the weekend of June 12-13, 1999, when I first preached a homily for the poor of Central America and Caribbean at my own parish of Christ the King in East Cleveland.

Bishop Anthony Pilla, then Bishop of Cleveland, had granted me a leave of absence from that pastorate to preach for Food for the Poor. I asked to preach my first homily at my own church so the parishioners had some idea what I would be doing with the year off.

Though a permanent position was not initially intended, after a second year was offered by the Bishop, I knew that I could never go back to administering a parish. I remember reflecting that as a pastor I found myself spending the majority of my time on budgets, bills and bureaucracy--managing a major organization. I had been ordained to teach, preach and preside.

Bishop Pilla eventually released me from my obligations to the Diocese of Cleveland and approved my joining the Diocese of Georgetown, Guyana in South America, whose bishop, Francis Alleyne, OSB, has assigned me to live in the United States indefinitely and to preach on behalf of the poor through Food for the Poor.

This has also freed me to continue preaching parish missions and retreats through **sabbath retreats**, my personal preaching ministry. Sharing the Word in preaching and celebrating Eucharist is the true gift of priesthood. What a blessing!

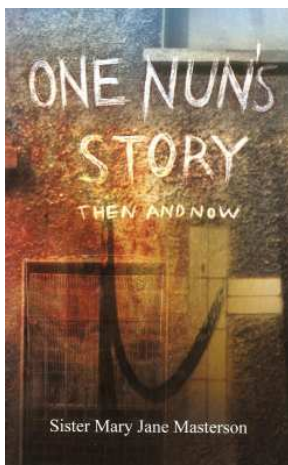

Saint Martin de Porres High School does it right

For the last two years I have been honored to minister on occasion to the students and faculty of St. Martin de Porres High School in Cleveland.

Saint Martin de Porres High School opened in fall 2004 to provide high-quality college-preparatory education to young people in Cleveland, OH, who would not otherwise be able to afford such an education. For funding, the school relies on an innovative Corporate Work Study Program first used at Cristo Rey Jesuit High School in Chicago, IL.

According to a recent article in *America* magazine, "Each student works five days each month in an entry-level clerical job in a professional work environment. The objective of these jobs is to reinforce the capabilities--reading comprehension, mathematics, discipline, a strong work ethic--that students need to be successful in college and career.

"The money Cristo Rey students earn from their jobs covers most of their school's operating costs. The remainder is covered by modest tuition payments and similarly modest fund-raising campaigns."

Saint Martin de Porres is located in the former St. Vitus elementary school in Cleveland. The school has forged partnerships with a number of businesses and not-for-profit organizations in and around Cleveland. In the fall of 2007, the school year began with a full contingent of four classes of students. They now have a student body of 368 students.

This June they graduate their second graduating class who, like their first, have all been accepted into college! That's doing it right! Check out their website: www.saintmartincleveland.org

Miles traveled, lessons learned

Looking back over the last ten years with Food for the Poor, it boggles my mind that I have preached in 388 parishes in 120 dioceses in 43 states. Add to those figures the 64 churches in which I have preached parish missions and the total in ten years is 452 churches! I have come to appreciate the deep concern our people have for the poor: over 29,000 new donors have contributed more than 1.5 million dollars to the poor. What an awesome ministry!

At the same time seeing the Church of the US has been an education. I have seen a Church struggling with 30-40 % attendance and priests stretched by the priest shortage. Many are pastoring two or three, even four parishes. These have become the most critical issues in the Church today.

Through Food for the Poor and our pilgrimages to the countries we serve, I have also come to understand the stark contrast between the way I live and the way our brothers and sisters in Central America and the Caribbean live. It has made my preaching on their behalf a profoundly personal mission.

Someone recently asked what was the most memorable event of the last ten years. Aside from the profound experience of visiting the poor, it has to be accepting a check for \$100,000 from a woman who wasn't even a parishioner of the church in which I was preaching. The Holy Spirit works in mysterious ways! www.foodforthe poor.org

After ten years my gratitude rests with Bishop Pilla, Bishop Alleyne and Food for the Poor for allowing me "to be priest."

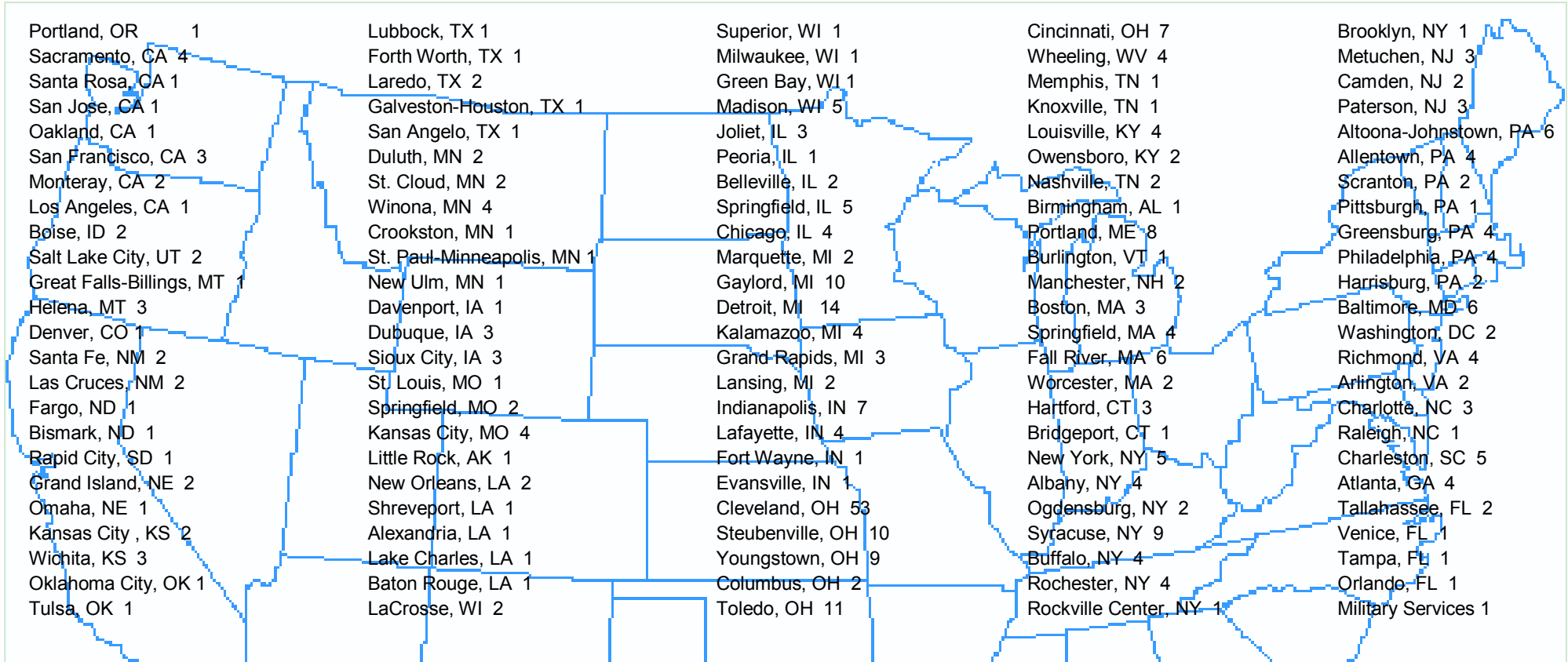

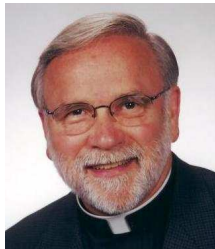
